







7 Steps to Becoming a Girl Scout Leader



1. Find adults to be co-leaders

- Troops must have two, unrelated adults registered as troop leaders.
- · No prior Girl Scout experience is needed!

2. Rally girls to join the troop

• The optimal troop size is 8-12 girls - larger troops require more troop co-leaders. Troops can have Girl Scouts from the same community, school, or neighborhood.

3. Spread the word about the troop

- GSH recruitment coordinator has flyers you can customize! Ask us for some through customercare@gshawaii.org
- · Use social media and word-of-mouth.

4. Select role as a troop co-leader

 Register as an annual Girl Scout member and troop co-leader.

5. Complete your background check

• Help ensure the safety of our Girl Scouts by completing a background check.

6. Meet your support network

• Connect with council to review troop leader basics, be introduced to your service unit, and discuss your personalized next steps.

7. Start your leader training

· Complete online training courses.

- · Teach girls they can do and be anything!
- Encourage girls to build their skills and ethics.
- Mentor girls as they grow as decision-makers.



Troop Co-Leader

- Admin tasks for troop registration, records, activity approvals.
- Communicate with girls, parents, and council staff.

Build a Team

- Facilitate girl-led planning of program activities for one or more grade levels.
- Plan meetings and organize activities using The Girl Scout Volunteer Toolkit.

Sure!

I can be part of the team.

Troop Treasurer or Troop Bank Signatory

- Set up and maintain troop banking records.
- Provide regular updates to the parents in the troop regarding the troop finances.
- Submit required financial paperwork each year.

Troop Cookie Manager

 Organize and manage the troop Cookie Program; distribution of products and rewards, keeping financial records and receipts.

Troop Volunteer

- Assist as needed, for as little or as much time as you can.
- Support troop meetings, share your knowledge for a skill workshop, sew badges on uniforms, sort products; whatever your skill level, your help is needed!

Troop First Aider

- Become the troop's certified helper in one or more activities: archery, camping, zip line, small craft, First Aid/CPR.
- Communicate with girls, parents, and council staff.

Troop Camp Specialist

- Empower girls to lead by encouraging activities and experiences outdoors.
- Help girls plan camp outings while following council safety guidelines.
